

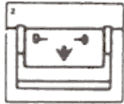
SAMPLE BALLOT

Voting Instructions

Step 1 Using both hands, insert the ballot card all the way into the Vote Recorder.



Step 2 Be sure the two slots in the end of your card fit down over the two red pins.



Step 3 To vote, hold the voting instrument straight up. Punch straight down through the ballot card for the candidates of your choice. Do not use pen or pencil.



Step 4 Vote all pages.

Step 5 After voting, remove the ballot card from the Vote Recorder.

Note: If you make a mistake return your ballot card and obtain another.

PUNCH OUT BALLOT CARD ONLY WITH PUNCHING DEVICE ATTACHED TO VOTOMATIC, NEVER WITH PEN OR PENCIL

PUNCH CARD BALLOT INSTRUCTIONS

- (a) To vote for all candidates of one party (a straight ticket), punch the card at the right of the party for whose candidates you wish to vote.
- (b) You may vote a split ticket by punching the card beside the party and then punching the card opposite the name of a candidate(s) of a different party.
- (c) If you have punched the card beside any party and wish to vote for candidates of more than one party in multi-seat races, only those candidates beside whose name you punch will receive a vote in that race.
- (d) You may also vote a split ticket by not making a punch for the party, but by punching beside the name of each candidate for whom you wish to vote.
- (e) To vote for a write-in candidate, punch the card beside the write-in position under which office you wish to vote; then place the write-in number for the office and write the person(s) name in the designated space at the top of the ballot. **DO NOT WRITE ON THESE PAGES IN THE VOTOMATIC, ONLY ON THE BALLOT YOU WERE GIVEN.**
- (f) If you tear or deface or wrongly punch the ballot card, return it and get another.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS			
I. Constitutional amendment to promote local economic and community development projects by (i) permitting the General Assembly to enact general laws giving counties, cities, and towns the power to finance public improvements associated with qualified private economic and community improvements within development districts, as long as the financing is secured by the additional tax revenues resulting from the enhanced property value within the development district and is not secured by a pledge of the local government's faith and credit or general taxing authority, which financing is not subject to a referendum; and (ii) permitting the owners of property in the development district to agree to a minimum tax value for their property, which is binding on future owners as long as the development district is in existence.

II. Constitutional amendment to provide that the General Assembly may place the clear proceeds of civil penalties, civil forfeitures, and civil fines collected by a State agency in a State fund to be used exclusively for maintaining free public schools.
